I've registered for the Jan. 13 webinar of AAUWs "It's My Vote." Absentee voting is underway and will close on Feb. 16 for the March 15 primary. The branch will compile a voting record for the Republicans who represent us in the Statehouse.

Since Rep. Boehner resigned, the March 15 primary will fill his unexpired term. There will be a special election on June 7 to elect someone for the full 2-year term and those persons will run for that office on Nov. 7. There are 17 Republicans, 1 Democrat, 1 Green Party, and 1 Socialist candidate competing for the seat.

Member Spotlight on

Anne Kaup-Fett

I received two B.S.'s - one in Biology (because I liked it) and one in Medical Technology (because I wanted to have a degree with a job attached to it) from Wright State University. I worked briefly at Kettering Medical Center and then for a private medical lab before realizing that I wasn't ever going to stop feeling creeped out in hospitals (so much for the marketable degree.) I went back to WSU and managed a laboratory there, working with toxic cyanobacteria (blue-green algae), the same stuff that's causing havoc in Grand Lake St. Mary's and Lake Erie. I was able to work on my Master's Degree in Environmental Science while there (yea!) and taught for a brief time in the Geology Department, teaching distance learning in contaminant hydrogeology.

I accepted the job at the Clark County Combined Health District so I could work with municipal solid waste landfills, composting, recycling, and other environmental facilities, but I also enjoy the other public health work that I do. For example, I conduct Healthy Homes Assessments to help people understand indoor air quality, allergens, and asthma and why they can feel unwell in their homes. Also, recently, I was able to work with a professor at Wittenberg University whose class is as interested in community gardens and the lead hazards that can exist in the soils as I am. Also - fun fact - I can actually write tickets to people for violations of Springfield Codified Ordinances (just like speeding tickets) so sometimes I feel like Dirty Harry.

I am now a Registered Sanitarian (isn't that a great old-fashioned word for a public health professional!) in the State of Ohio and a Certified Healthy Homes Specialist.
